Good news in Congress for gun rights supporters! Representatives MARILYN MUSGRAVE (R-CO) and VIRGIL GOODE (I-VA) have announced the creation of **the Congressional Second Amendment Caucus**.

Initially comprised of 38 Members of Congress, this caucus is **solely dedicated to the right of lawful individuals to own firearms** as granted in the Second Amendment of the U.S. Constitution.

"As lawmakers in our nation's highest legislative body, we must fight to preserve the Constitutional right for individual citizens to keep and bear arms," said MUSGRAVE.

"While many in our nation's capital seek to chip away at the right of firearm ownership and possession, **the 2nd Amendment Caucus is committed to defending lawful gun owners' constitutional rights** in our nation, without compromise. Their voice will be heard in Congress."

"In fighting for and protecting our Second Amendment rights, it is important to be vigilant," said VIRGIL GOODE. "I hope that this caucus will further that goal."

The caucus was created by MUSGRAVE and GOODE **to ensure lawful gun owners are tenaciously defended in Congress**. Its mission statement says:

The members of the Congressional Second Amendment Caucus know and understand that the Second Amendment to the Constitution is clearly written to protect the fundamental and individual right to keep and bear arms.

Furthermore, we understand that the Second Amendment does not refer to a collective right of federal or state governments. The Second Amendment refers to the individual citizen's right to keep and bear arms for the purpose of defense, recreation, and collection.

We oppose the banning of firearms, their accessories, their manufacture and their importation. Furthermore, we support recognizing the right of lawful citizens to carry a weapon both at home and while traveling the nation.

In upholding these principles we have joined the Congressional Second Amendment Caucus. This caucus' purpose for existence is solely to accomplish the above stated goals and protect the Second Amendment as it is written.

Among the 38 founding members of the caucus were: ROSCOE BARTLETT (R-MD), ERIC CANTOR (R-VA), STEVE CHABOT (R-OH), JO ANN DAVIS (R-VA), JIM DEMINT (R-SC), J.D. HAYWORTH (R-AZ), PETER HOEKSTRA (R-MI), JOHN HOSTETTLER (R-IN), ERNEST ISTOOK (R-OK), SAM JOHNSON (R-TX), SUE MYRICK (R-NC), MIKE PENCE (R-IN), STEVE PEARCE (R-NM), JOE PITTS (R-PA), JOHN SHADEGG (R-AZ), TOM TANCREDO (R-CO), AND PAT TOOMEY (R-PA).

In other federal gun news, Attorney General JOHN ASHCROFT has announced that **former Secret Service Assistant Director CARL J. TRUSCOTT** will serve as **Director of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF)**.

TRUSCOTT was previously head of the Secret Service's Office of Protective Research. Prior to that he was Special Agent in Charge of the Presidential Protective Division, supervising all protective matters for the President, First Family and the White House. His law enforcement career began in 1980 as an Investigator for the New Jersey Department of Law and Public Safety.

IS BUSH OFF-TARGET? IS KERRY SHOOTING BLANKS?

Fox New has reported that **many gun owners are unhappy with President GEORGE W. BUSH**, but concerns about his support of an "assault-weapons" ban and the Patriot Act **may not be enough to get them to vote Democratic**.

Some gun owners are **displeased with BUSH** because he **supports extending the federal assault weapons ban**, which expires in September. But the ban extension bill has been removed from the Senate agenda after Democrats sabotaged a bill to protect the firearms industry by adding it as an amendment, and it will not pass this session. Gun activists also fear that the anti-terror Patriot Act **intrudes on individual liberties**.

LARRY PRATT, executive director of the 300,000-member Gun Owners of America, said, "Bush's problem is that he's been bumbling on the issue. He does stand to lose the enthusiasm he needs from the Second Amendment base, and perhaps even lose the Reagan Democrats."

But ALAN GOTTLIEB, chairman of the 650,000-member Citizens Committee for the Right to Keep and Bear Arms, said that **gun owners would ultimately support BUSH** when they learn that JOHN KERRY, who has come from behind to become the shoo-in Democrat candidate to run against President BUSH, **has a virtually seamless voting record against gun rights**.

GOTTLIEB said, "BUSH is not with us 100 percent of the time. He is with us 90 percent of the time. **JOHN KERRY is with us 0 percent of the time**. Gun owners don't have much of a choice."

GOTTLIEB added that he personally liked the fact that there are "a couple of people out there screaming." But when push comes to shove, GOTTLIEB concluded, **everyone is going to vote for BUSH**. It would be foolish not to. It would be cutting off your nose to spite your face."

JOE WALDRON, executive director of the Citizens Committee for the Right to Keep and Bear Arms, pointed out that "KERRY has flip-flopped on just about every issue to come before him in the U.S. Senate save one: gun control. **He has been a consistent advocate of increased gun control**, voting FOR every gun control proposal offered in the Senate, and against pro-gun actions such as the Firearm Owners Protection Act of 1986."

And as far as gun owners voting for KERRY or just sitting the election out, WALDRON noted, "There will be only two results of the 2004 presidential election: there will be a winner, and there will be one or more losers. **Winners and losers. That is all**. And the only two potential winners are GEORGE W. BUSH and JOHN KERRY.

A KERRY victory, and the potential coattail effect on congressional elections, would be an unmitigated disaster for gun owners.

CHRIS W. COX, executive director of the National Rifle Association's Institute of Legislative Affairs, gave a quick overview of KERRY's voting record:

"His earliest votes came during the mid-1980s battle to enact the Firearm Owners Protection Act. **KERRY voted against all of the NRA-backed amendments** during debate over the bill, and then was one of only 15 Senators to oppose final passage of the critical package of pro-gun reforms. If KERRY had his way, gun owners would still have to register to purchase .22 rimfire ammunition and we'd all be subject to a 10-year prison sentence for selling a gun to a friend or family member." But there's more.

NRA First Vice President Sandra S. Froman said, "If JOHN KERRY is elected President, we might well see anti-gunners CHARLES SHUMER or HILLARY CLINTON or JANET RENO wearing the black robes of the U.S. Supreme Court."

TOP LAW FIRM WITHDRAWS FROM NEW YORK CITY GUN INDUSTRY LAWSUIT

The firm of Weil, Gotshal & Manges that had offered to represent New York City pro bono in a lawsuit against the gun industry **has withdrawn from the case**, citing potential conflicts of interest.

The firm may have represented clients involved with Smith & Wesson, one of the defendants that could be affected by the outcome of the New York case.

BRADY CAMPAIGN SEEKS COURT ORDER AGAINST JUSTICE DEPARTMENT

The Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence and the Million Mom March have jointly filed papers in federal court **seeking a preliminary injunction** barring the Justice Department and the ATF from approving the repair of so-called "assault weapons."

The request that an injunction be issued that would stop the Justice Department from allowing replacement of "receivers" until the Brady Center's lawsuit to end the repairs is resolved.

This bogus lawsuit is intended to pressure Congress into extending the ban on certain semi-automatic rifles.

OHIO COALITION ASKS COURT TO STOP CONCEALED-CARRY PERMIT APPLICATIONS

The Ohio Coalition Against Gun Violence has asked the Ohio Supreme Court **to stop the state's sheriffs from selling CC permits**, saying the resources for conducting background checks on applicants are inadequate. The law does not provide enough money for sheriffs to process the applications, the group said.

PHILADELPHIA LAWSUIT SEEKS TO PUNISH GUN DEALER FOR ACCIDENTAL SHOOTING

TENNILLE JEFFERSON, mother of 7-year old NAFIS JEFFERSON, who was shot to death by another 7-year-old with a revolver they had found under an abandoned car in South Philadelphia, is suing JON K. SAUERS, owner of Sauers Trading **for selling the gun to PERRY J. BRUCE, a legal buyer**, who illegally resold it. How the gun got under the car is unknown. The Brady Center is involved in the suit, which is scheduled for trial in Philadelphia Common Pleas Court in July.

U.S. APPEALS COURT UPHOLDS RETROACTIVE GUN BAN FOR FELONS

The Richmond, Virginia-based U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit has **upheld a 1995 change in North Carolina law** limiting the rights of felons to own handguns from a five year period after completing a sentence to a lifelong prohibition. The court ruled that MICHAEL ANTHONY FARROW was guilty of being a felon in possession of firearms after he entered a guilty plea, counting on having the indictment thrown out because it was more than five years after he completed an earlier sentence. However, in the meantime, the North Carolina law had been changed and the Appeals Court upheld it even retroactively.

DEMAR CONTINUES FIGHT AGAINST VILLAGE GUN BAN

HALE DEMAR is fighting efforts by the Village of Willmette, Illinois to dismiss his court challenge against the Village's ordinance banning handguns. DEMAR shot burglar MORIO BILLINGS, which was ruled self defense by county prosecutors, but the Village pressed charges in its 15-year-old handgun ban, which carries a \$750 fine and confiscation. DEMAR filed a counterclaim that **the ban was unconstitutional as applied to his case and violated privacy rights**.

MARYLAND LAW REQUIRING GUN LOCKS CHALLENGED

JIM PURTILLO, a Beltsville advocate for gun owners, has launched **a legal challenge to the four-year-old law** that made Maryland the first state to require built-in locks on new handguns. Purtillo's suit filed in Montgomery County Circuit Court argues that the law is being enforced too strictly and should still allow gun dealers to sell some weapons that don't have built-in lock-and-key devices. PURTILLO says that a simple safety, available on most firearms, fits within the law's requirements.

ALABAMA HOUSE PANEL OKS BILL TO KEEP GUNS FROM MENTALLY ILL

The killing of two Athens, Alabama police officers by a man with a history of mental illness has prompted a bill to require the state to report involuntary commitments to the federal instant background check database that screens gun buyers for disqualified purchasers.

Gunman Farron Barskdale, with a history of involuntary mental commitments, a federal disqualification, passed the mandatory background check because Alabama is one of 46 states that does not reported involuntary mental commitments.

The bill, which passed the Alabama Senate 21-7 and received unanimous support from the House Judiciary Committee, would require the state to report involuntary commitments. The bill must pass a House floor vote and receive the governor's signature to become law.

CALIFORNIA'S COW PALACE GUN BAN BILL ADVANCES

The California Senate Public Safety Committee has voted 4-2 to support SB 1733, a bill that blocks the sale of firearms at the Cow Palace, a popular gun show venue in Daly City near San Francisco.

Gun rights defenders decried the bill as unnecessary since California regulations on gun shows are extremely strict and the shows do not feed guns into the nearby criminal-infested Bayview-Hunter's Point neighborhoods known for violence.

LOS ANGELES 'TEACHING GUN SCARE AT SCHOOL' BILL PASSES ASSEMBLY

A so-called "gun violence prevention" bill was reported out of the California Senate's Education Committee recently. It authorizes classroom propaganda showing gunshot wounds and shooting victims, merely instilling fear, but nothing about handling guns safely, about self defense or about the Second Amendment right to keep and bear arms. The bill is headed for the Senate floor.

FLORIDA SHOOTING RANGE BILL HEADED FOR GOVERNOR'S DESK

SB 1156, legislation to stop government lawsuits against shooting ranges, passed both houses by a better than 2 to 1 margin. Florida Governor Jeb Bush (R) has stated that he will sign this bill into law. It prevents government lawsuits as long as ranges use sound environmental practices. Government employees who bring such a lawsuit will be charged with a first-degree misdemeanor.

ILLINOIS SELF DEFENSE BILL ON HOLD

A bill to recognize the legal rights of gun owners who fire in self-defense has been held up by Rep. William Delgado, House Judiciary Committee chairman, who said he would create a subcommittee to study the measure, a bad sign.

The legislation was a response to the case of a Wilmette man, Hale DeMar, who shot a burglar in his home and was then charged with violating a local ordinance that outlawed owning handguns.

ILLINOIS GOVERNOR DEFIES FEDERAL GUN RECORDS LAW

Gov. Rod Blagojevich (D) is ignoring warnings from the U.S. Justice Department that he must comply with a law Congress passed in January requiring the FBI to destroy records of instant background checks within 24 hours. Illinois is illegally keeping computerized records of 2.15 million firearms transactions since 1992.

Gov. Blagojevich tried to buy time by sending a letter to U.S. Attorney General John Ashcroft urging him to repeal the 24-hour limit. Gun rights defenders say the Illinois database violates the Second Amendment right to keep and bear arms and the right to privacy.

IOWA GUN RANGE BILL PASSES

HB 2393, a bill that gives public shooting ranges additional protection from encroachment, has passed both Houses and is headed to the desk of Governor Tom Vilsack (D) for his expected signature.

OVERRIDE OF KANSAS GOVERNOR'S CONCEALED CARRY VETO FAILS

The Kansas House has failed to override Gov. Kathleen Sebelius' veto of a bill that would have allowed Kansans to carry concealed handguns. The override required a two-thirds vote, or 84 members in the 150-member House, but received 77 votes for and 47 against.

GUN CONTROL MEASURES KILLED IN LOUISIANA

Four anti-gun bills pushed by a New Orleans Democrat were overwhelmed by gun owners in a session of the House Committee on the Administration of Criminal Justice. The bills would have banned "assault weapons" in Louisiana, required background checks of gun buyers at gun shows, prohibited carrying guns at parades and established a statewide fingerprint database. Rep. Cedric Richmond's bills all died or were withdrawn in the face of opposition.

MISSISSIPPI RECIPROCITY BILL WINS

Mississippi Gov. Haley Barbour (R) has signed HB 989, Right to Carry Reciprocity, requiring the state to recognize carry permits from states that recognize Mississippi permits. Some two dozen states have reciprocity under the new law.

MISSOURI GUN PERMIT FUNDING BILL ADVANCES

HB 156, a bill to solve the Missouri Supreme Court's concerns about the funding mechanism for Sheriffs' issuance of Right to Carry permits, passed out of the Crime Prevention and Public Safety Committee to be considered on the House floor.

However, Gov. Bob Holden (D) has said publicly that he will veto this measure, or any other, unless it repeals Right to Carry or sends it back to a referendum vote.

NEW HAMPSHIRE WON'T ELIMINATE CONCEALED CARRY PERMITS

Efforts have been blocked to make New Hampshire the third state, after Alaska and Vermont, that does not require a permit to carry a concealed handgun.

The House Criminal Justice Committee voted 16-3 to reject a bill that would eliminate the state's current permit system. The permit-elimination bill still has a chance in the full House.

NORTH CAROLINA CONCEALED CARRY RECIPROCITY EXPANDS

North Carolina and Texas have formally agreed to recognize each other's Right to Carry permits. Indiana was also added to North Carolina's recognition list, bringing the number to 23 of state-issued RTC permits North Carolina has agreed to recognize.

State Attorney General Roy Cooper has ensured that his office continues work to add more states to the list.

OHIO BILL STOPS ZONING AGAINST GUN SHOPS

A bill which exempts gun businesses from most zoning laws has sailed through both houses of the General Assembly, passing by a 77-17 vote in the House and a 34-4 margin in the Senate.

The Ohio cities of Dayton and Bellevue had refused to allow gunsmith Peter Garrett to locate in their central business districts. The new law stops such arbitrary restrictions by anti-gun city officials.

OKLAHOMA ECONOMIC INCENTIVE BILL WOULD INVITE GUNMAKERS TO RELOCATE

Senate Joint Resolution 54 has passed the House and is awaiting a concurrence vote in the Senate. SJR 54 instructs the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry to work with an Oklahoma higher education institution offering a gunsmith curriculum to develop strategies to encourage firearm manufacturers to locate in gun-friendly Oklahoma. Existing economic incentives are to be extended to the firearms industry as inducement to relocate existing plants.

ISRAELI POLICE URGED CITIZENS TO ARM THEMSELVES FOR PASSOVER

Police Commissioner Shlomo Aharonishki advised Israelis with valid gun licenses to carry a weapon with them during the recent Passover holiday, according to the Israeli newspaper *Haaretz*.

AROUND THE WORLD

Defense Minister Shaul Mofaz warned at the time that "Terror organizations, in particular Hamas, will make every effort during Passover to carry out a large-scale attack."

Israel had been at a high state of alert since the assassination of Hamas leader Sheikh Ahmed Yassin. Citizens were urged to bear arms and repel any attack with deadly force.

CANADA'S GOVERNMENT SPENT MILLIONS FOR ADS SELLING GUN REGISTRY

The federal Liberal government quadrupled a 2000 ad contract to a whopping \$2.1 million in an effort to sell the already-over-budget gun registry to Canadians. The lucrative contract with Montreal ad firm Groupaction Marketing was repeatedly amended upward over 10 months, from \$515,740 to \$2.1 million.

Some increases were to pay for creating TV ads meant to entice Aboriginals into registering their firearms.

Groupaction is under RCMP investigation for allegedly billing taxpayers three times - or \$1.6 million - for the same report.

AUSTRALIAN GUN IMPORTS OUTSTRIP BUYBACK

Despite a \$60 million handgun buyback program that destroyed about 65,000 guns handed in last year, Australians imported 100,000 firearms in the past three years - 40,939 last year, 28,016 in 2001-02 and 30,666 in 2000-01.

The Sporting Shooters Association said the figures confirmed buyback schemes were a waste of money, with gun owners simply restocking and upgrading to legal weapons.

Association president Sebastian Ziccone of the state of Victoria said, "The government pays people buckets of money to hand back currently illegal weapons and a large number of people then go out and buy currently legal firearms to participate in their sport."

ITALY PLANS LAW TO ALLOW PROPERTY OWNERS TO SHOOT INTRUDERS

Silvio Berlusconi's popular government in Italy is to change the law to allow victims to defend themselves against intruders by killing them without fear of prosecution and imprisonment.

Italy's justice minister, Roberto Castelli, added that the benefit of the doubt should be given to shopkeepers who shot fleeing robbers in the back as they escaped the crime scene.

A committee headed by a leading Italian prosecutor is drawing up proposals for broad changes to the penal code, giving crime victims stronger rights of self-defense. Mr. Castelli said, "In the new penal code, we shall be changing the concept of legitimate defense, which today is too far unbalanced in favor of the criminal, to the detriment of honest people."

NO GUNS FOR CONTRACTORS IN IRAQ

As the insurgency in Iraq continues, the Department of Defense has proposed a new rule for most of the estimated 70,000 civilian contractors working in the region: They cannot carry guns.

Members of the National Contract Management Association strongly object, noting that many workers in the region are former military personnel and prefer to be armed.

Nick Sanders, head of the National Defense Industrial Association, said the proposed rule tells contractors they are responsible for their security, but then says they cannot be armed. Contractors may have to be unarmed, he said, but they should use armed private security.

GUN NEWS TICKER - QUICK TAKES ON THE NEWS

●**Madison, Wisconsin:** A few students at the University of Wisconsin, Madison are protesting the upcoming ESPN Great Outdoor Games because of the target sports, archery, rifle and shotgun competitions. UW student Lisa Shimotake of the anti-gun student group Against Guns objected to including the events because "it makes guns look less threatening" and bullets might hit a home in the area. Ted Ballweg, director of sales and marketing at the Alliant Energy Center, site of the events, said there are no high powered rifles and, "You couldn't physically shoot a gun as far as the nearest residence."

●**Indianapolis:** The *Indianapolis Star* has caved in to pressure from the anti-gun group, National Campaign to Close the Newspaper Loophole, and changed its policy on firearms advertising. The newspaper now only accepts gun advertisements from licensed firearms dealers and will not take classified ads for guns from unlicensed sellers. The anti-gun group, along with Hoosiers Concerned About Gun Violence and the Indiana Partnership to Prevent Firearms Violence, demanded the paper follow its program, which it did. That brings the total number of gun classified ad shut-out newspapers to 18.

●**Denver:** Gun rights advocates are advising their members to ignore the new Gun Owners' Rights Party, which was qualified with 10,296 signatures by Denver attorney John Sackett, according to Secretary of State Donetta Davidson. Steve Schreiner, spokesman for the Firearms Coalition of Colorado, said, "Minor parties only detract from votes."

●**Hollywood:** Jennifer Lopez's close friend Marc Anthony is so concerned about her safety that he carries a gun around with him to protect her. A source told magazine *Us Weekly*: "Marc often has a gun on him. He feels more secure taking care of himself and whoever he is with."

●**Gainesville, Florida:** A new rifle and pistol club has formed at the University of Florida, where firearms are not allowed on campus. Club Treasurer Andrew Kwan says the club will cover all aspects of firearms including improved marksmanship and gun-handling. No anti-gun criticism has appeared yet, said Kwan.

●**Washington:** A shipment of about 7,500 AK-47s worth an estimated \$6 million was seized by Italian authorities who suspected they were being smuggled, but the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives confirmed that they were legal and had proper permits. The automatic mechanisms will be removed in the U.S. and replaced with legal ones by Century International Arms Inc. in Vermont.

●**Artesia, New Mexico:** Training at a federal law enforcement center has begun for pilots of cargo airlines including FedEx and United Parcel Service Inc. to carry guns. Successful pilots will be deputized as federal officers. The transportation Security Administration is spending \$25 million this year on pilot training sessions that run twice each week.

●**Long Island, New York:** Pro-gun Long Island eye doctor Marilyn O'Grady has announced that she will seek the Conservative Party nomination to challenge Democrat U.S. Sen. Charles Schumer. O'Grady ran as a Republican two years ago against anti-gun Rep. Carolyn McCarthy.

●**Staten Island, New York:** A City Council bill that would require guns to be equipped with childproof "smart gun" technology has been blasted by gun owners as a dumb idea. Smart-gun technology is currently not commercially available, so the bill wouldn't take effect until three years after the technology is first introduced on the market. Tony Castellano, of the Staten Island Sportsmen's Club, said, "They aim to disarm us. Enforce the laws that we have and you won't have any problems."

●**Ukiah, California:** Concealed weapons permits have risen 500 percent in Mendocino County since Sheriff Tony Craver was elected in 1999 and promised to expand the availability of the permits to law-abiding citizens. More than 1,000 Mendocino County residents are now licensed to carry guns in public.

Parting Shot

DON'T INTRUDE ON ME

Cascade, Montana is a small town south of Great Falls, where the Cascade County regional jail is located. Paul Anthony Anderson, 26, who was serving 10 years on a Missoula robbery involving a weapon, walked away from the jail and traveled toward Cascade.

He broke into the rural home of Rob and Sandy Nylund in open farmland, where he was shot once in the chest with a handgun and died before deputies and medical personnel arrived.

In Huntsville, Alabama, Donnie Dwain Shankle walked into Freeway Beverage Store on Highway 24, pulled out a gun and demanded money. A store employee pulled out his gun and Shankle quickly told the clerk he was just kidding. Police charged Shankle with first degree robbery.

A man with a criminal record for breaking and entering homes came to the dwelling of a woman in east-side Detroit brandishing a nickel-plated handgun. The woman, who owns a car dealership, tried to shut her screen door against him, but the man pulled it open and began shoving her into the house. She pulled a handgun from her purse and fired five times. The man fell to the ground between the door and the driveway. He died before police arrived.

75-year-old George Finch was sleeping in a recliner in a front room of his Indianapolis home when Kevin Richardson broke into his house. Finch got his gun, a semiautomatic pistol, and told Richardson to leave. He kept coming at Finch, who shot him in the thigh. Richardson went out of the house through the window he broke to gain entry and ran a short way before collapsing. Police took him to Wishard Memorial Hospital where he died later.

A 63-year-old homeowner in South Phoenix, Arizona heard a living-room window shatter one recent afternoon and found Ronald Freese, 38, and his brother Rudy, 40, in his home. The homeowner shot Ronald with a handgun and Rudy ran to his nearby home to get relatives to check on Ronald. Ronald was taken to Maricopa County Medical Center where he was declared dead. Rudy may be charged with first-degree murder if prosecutors allege he was involved in a crime that resulted in a death. The homeowner will not be charged.

Quirinius Wilson, 24, and his 29-year-old wife were asleep when Carlos Cannon, 22, broke into their Shreveport, Louisiana home. Canon fired his semi-automatic handgun and grazed Wilson's wife's arm. Wilson fired more than 12 rounds from his SKS assault rifle, killing the intruder. Who says assault weapons have no legitimate purpose?
