The Second Amendment Foundation has joined with the National Rifle Association to successfully obtain a temporary restraining order from the U.S. District Court of the Eastern Division in Louisiana that **stopped authorities in and around the City of New Orleans from seizing firearms** from law-abiding citizens in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, and ordered them to return any they already took.

Gun rights advocates everywhere hailed the victory. JOE WALDRON, Executive Director of the Bellevue, Washington-based Citizens Committee for the Right to Keep and Bear Arms (CCRKBA), said, "U.S. District Court Judge JAY ZAINNEY **has given back to victims of the hurricane their constitutional right to bear arms** and defend themselves from the robbers, rapists and desperate drug addicts that have emerged to further victimize those whose lives are already shattered by the natural disaster."

Defendants in the case, **New Orleans Mayor RAY NAGIN, Police Superintendent P. EDWIN COMPASS III and St. Tammany Sheriff JACK STRAIN** filed court papers in Baton Rouge, denying that they ordered the confiscation of firearms.

However, *gun confiscations have been highly publicized* since the *New York Times* quoted New Orleans Police Superintendent EDDIE COMPASS, who said, "**Only law enforcement are allowed to have weapons,**" and ABC News quoted Deputy Police Chief WARREN RILEY stating, "**No one will be able to be armed. We are going to take all the weapons.**"

A KTVU San Francisco, California camera crew filmed visiting **California Highway Patrol officers tackling an elderly woman identified as PATRICIA KONIE, to seize her pistol** and forcibly remove her from her home.

An ABC news crew accompanying an Oklahoma National Guard unit filmed another incident in which **homeowners were handcuffed and disarmed, then released but without their firearms.**

SAF and the NRA documented some **40 cases of people having their weapons taken away** after Katrina hit August 29, during a complete collapse of the government's ability to protect people *after crime spiraled out of control.*

The Second Amendment Foundation issued a statement following Judge ZAINNEY's order, saying, "What must happen now is for authorities in the New Orleans area to **explain how they will return all of those firearms to their rightful owners, and do it promptly.**

"What this ruling affirms is that even in the face of great natural disasters, **governments cannot arbitrarily deprive citizens of their rights.** Thanks to some great teamwork between SAF and the NRA, this sort of thing will hopefully never happen again."

"However," said CCRKBA's WALDRON, "if it becomes necessary, gun rights defenders are prepared to go to all fifty states and **correct any existing emergency legislation** that condones arbitrary seizure of private firearms from law-abiding citizens under the guise of protecting public safety.

"What Katrina taught us all is that we can't always count on government to protect the public safety. **Every citizen should have the right to self defense.**"

"CONTROL BORDERS, NOT GUNS," SAYS NATIONAL GUN RIGHTS CAMPAIGN

The Bellevue, Washington-based Citizens Committee for the Right to Keep and Bear Arms (CCRKBA), has announced a campaign to flood the White House with letters from American gun owners demanding that government put its energies into controlling the borders rather than guns owned by law-abiding citizens.

"We intend to tell President Bush that American gun owners are tired of taking the heat and the rap for increasing numbers of violent crimes committed by illegal aliens," said CCRKBA Executive Director Joe Waldron.

"We're not going to let far-left anti-gunners like Ted Kennedy, Chuck Schumer and Barbara Boxer use violent crime committed by illegal aliens to bolster their incessant campaign to take away our gun rights."

**BORDER CONTROL
NOT GUN CONTROL**

The problem is serious and growing. Earlier this year, Gun Week, a national firearms newspaper, reported that estimates run as high as 30 percent of the 2 million convicts now incarcerated in the nation's prisons are illegal aliens.

The public is aware. A Zogby survey commissioned by the Second Amendment Foundation found that American citizens, by a three-to-one margin, think border control is far more important to national security and fighting crime than gun control.

The survey revealed that 70 percent of the respondents believe border control is more important, while only 23 percent favor more gun control. Seven percent of the respondents were undecided. The survey was conducted September 6-7 by randomly contacting more than 1,150 households around the country. The margin of error is plus-or-minus 2.9 percent, Zogby said.

People with household income less than \$15,000 are more likely to support gun control.

Also supporting gun control are one-third of Democrats, Hispanics, single adults, and residents of large cities, along with 28 percent of college graduates and residents of the 11 Western states.

Enough is enough.

We can't let illegal aliens destroy our rights and our safety.

So CCRKBA's campaign is doing something about it.

The first wave of CCRKBA's Border Control campaign is now reaching a quarter-million gun owners, to be followed soon by the distribution of 1.5 million bumper stickers bearing the message "Border Control - Not Gun Control."

Waldron said, "Our bumper sticker will be printed in both English and Spanish so that everyone understands our message."

It's important that illegals from Mexico grasp that message.

As Waldron said, "We know than an overwhelming number of outstanding homicide warrants in Los Angeles last year pointed to illegal aliens."

Waldron also noted that about two-thirds of all felony warrants in Los Angeles last year were reportedly for illegals.

"And yet the gun control crowd insists that taking away our gun rights will somehow quell this epidemic," added Waldron. "These are the same people who want to give voting rights to illegal aliens to help elect left-wing anti-gun candidates."

The campaign's message is strong and compelling: We need to control our borders, not perfectly legal firearms.

Our government should seriously restrict access to our country by people who have no right to be here, rather than restricting the gun rights of citizens who have every right to be here.

GOVERNMENT SURVEILLANCE PROMPTS LAWSUIT PLAN

Steven Elliot, owner of C&E Gun Shows in Richmond, Virginia, has documented federal law enforcement abuses against his gun show and its customers that have led him to consult attorneys in preparation for filing a civil rights violation lawsuit. Richmond City and Henrico County police, acting under instructions from the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF), conducted "residence checks," went to customer homes, got confidential information about gun buyers and shared it with relatives and neighbors, according to Freedom of Information Act requests obtained by Cybercast News Service.

Elliot said that if he can get enough people who believe their civil rights have been violated, he will file a class action lawsuit in federal court.

SIGNIFICANT PARTS OF NEW YORK GUN SHOW LAW TOSSED OUT

U.S. District Judge Charles Siragusa has thrown out parts of New York state law regulating firearms sales at gun shows, ruling that one of the statute's definitions of a gun show is so broad that it "infringes on constitutionally protected rights to free speech, assembly and petition."

The broad definition, "an event held by organizations devoted to firearm collecting or competitive shooting" could force gun clubs to do background checks at pancake breakfasts they sponsor, and was thrown out.

A second definition still stands in state law, and requires background checks on gun buyers at specific types of events based on numbers of gun exhibitors and firearms for sale at the event.

MISSOURI DECISION: CONCEALED CARRY APPLICANTS MUST ANSWER QUESTIONS

Paul Heidbrink, and everyone else in Missouri, must answer background questions to qualify for concealed gun permits, according to an appeals court ruling that the state supreme court refused to review.

The appeals court last May rejected a lower court ruling that Heidbrink did not have to answer background questions, ruling that the right to bear arms in Missouri is "neither absolute nor unconditional."

The appeals court sent the case back to St. Charles County Circuit Judge Ted House, saying he erroneously stopped the sheriff from inquiring into Heidbrink's criminal convictions and less-than honorable military discharge, which could disqualify him from gun purchases. Heidbrink admitted a bad-conduct discharge from the Navy, but said it was not "under dishonorable conditions."

The state high court refused to review the appeals court decision, meaning the case is back in Judge House's court for a new ruling.

OHIO CITY'S BAN ON GUNS IN PARKS UPHELD

Bruce Beatty, a Wood County, Ohio gun rights advocate, has been found guilty of violating a Toledo city ordinance banning concealed weapons in city parks. Beatty had worn a .45-caliber pistol in a holster under his jacket last April in Ottawa Park, where he sponsored a party to challenge the ban, and was arrested.

Toledo Municipal Judge Gene Zmuda found Beatty in violation, fined him \$50 and ordered him to pay court costs. Beatty will appeal the misdemeanor conviction.

MINNESOTA COUNTY COURT SIDES WITH CHURCHES IN CONCEALED CARRY SUIT

Hennepin County District Judge LaJune Thomas Lange has granted two Minneapolis - St. Paul churches a temporary injunction exempting them from a new state law requiring that they either post a sign or verbally inform people that concealed handguns aren't allowed on their property.

"The 2005 Act impermissibly intrudes into the free exercise of religion by arbitrary definitions, which dictate restrictions on the use of church property for worship, childcare, parking and rental space," Lange wrote.

Her ruling applies only in Hennepin County until a trial is held.

ALABAMA LAWMAKER FILES SELF-DEFENSE BILL

Your home is your castle unless somebody breaks in. Under current Alabama law, a home owner must retreat to the farthest corner in the house, and if you have to use deadly force then, you must prove the intruder had deadly force.

Otherwise you can be arrested by police and sued by the intruder.

That will end if Rep. Albert Hall (D-Gurley) has his way. He has prefiled a bill that would expand the circumstances in which a person could use deadly force in self defense or the defense of others.

His bill also covers carjackings.

CALIFORNIA AMMO BILL GOES TO GOVERNOR

Assembly Bill 996, by Assemblyman Mark Ridley-Thomas (D-Los Angeles) has been sent to Governor Schwarzenegger's desk.

AB 996 would require all retailers to display and sell ammunition in a manner that is only accessible by an employee, not the purchaser. Violations would result in a misdemeanor.

BRADY CAMPAIGN TRIES TO SCARE AWAY FLORIDA TOURISTS WITH GUN THREATS

In a typical fit of hysteria, the Washington-based Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence has launched a newspaper, billboard and flier handout campaign with the slogan: "Visitor Warning. Florida residents can use deadly force. Please be careful." A silhouette of the state of Florida is superimposed over a handgun.

It is a shameless attempt to repeal the new "stand your ground" self defense law that passed the Florida House 94-20 and the Senate without a single nay vote. The law protects law-abiding citizens who use deadly force in self defense against attackers.

Florida is a tourism-based economy, with 80 million visitors a year. The campaign is a deliberate attempt to hurt the state's business in order to force legislators to revert to the old law that protected criminals and punished law-abiding citizens who came under attack.

HONOLULU POLICE ISSUE MORE THAN 10,000 GUN PERMITS

A public concern over the ineffectiveness of government in the face of criminals such as the 9/11 Islamic terrorists and the looters that ran uncontrolled in the wake of Hurricane Katrina has brought on a surge in the number of people buying firearms on Oahu for their family emergency preparedness kits.

The Honolulu Police Department recently announced it had approved 10,467 gun purchase permit applications in 2004 and 7,408 permits up to September 1 this year, which is ahead of last year.

Some of the licenses come from the growing number of private security companies deploying armed guards. The U.S. Navy this year outsourced security for its Hawaii bases to a private company. The remainder are civilians buying for self defense.

SURPRISE: COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS COMMISSIONERS IGNORE PROPOSED GUN BAN

An ordinance proposed by a rabid anti-gun commissioner to ban so-called "assault weapons" in Cook County (Chicago and vicinity) failed to gain enough support to get on the Board of Commissioner's September 20 meeting agenda.

Larry Suffredin (D-Evanston), the anti-gun advocate, proposed the ordinance (no surprise), but the County Board of 12 Democrats and 5 Republicans ignored it (big surprise). Insiders say the board thinks Suffredin is grand-standing for special interest groups rather than considering good government.

BRADY BUNCH TRIES TO KILL MICHIGAN STAND YOUR GROUND BILL

Spreading imaginary tales of coming bloodbaths in the street, the Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence is committing violence on the truth in order to kill the self defense bill recently introduced in the Michigan legislature.

Mischaracterizing the self defense measure as a "Shoot First" bill is typical of the unethical tactics that Brady leaders prefer.

ANIMAL RIGHTS GROUPS TRY TO REVIVE DOVE HUNTING BAN

After a long-fought battle by sportsmens' groups to restore dove hunting in Michigan, they won a 2004 law and a compromise under which Gov. Jennifer Granholm signed the bill, but restricted initial hunting to a limited area of southern Michigan.

The bird, known as the mourning dove, is not endangered or threatened with extinction, but the notorious animal rights group, the Humane Society of the United States (not affiliated with real animal shelters) and the National Audubon Society have mounted a ballot initiative to stop the hunt.

IN THE STATES

Hunters have formed a coalition to raise money to fight the initiative. The U.S. Sportsmen's Alliance is partnering with the Michigan United Conservation Clubs, the National Rifle Association and other groups. Anti-hunting groups have already raised at least \$272,000 for the campaign.

NEW YORK GOVERNOR SIGNS PRO-GUN HUNTING BILL

Gone are the days that New York hunters could only use shotguns, muzzle-loaders, pistols and bows when pursuing deer and bear. Gov. George Pataki has signed a bill allowing the use of rifles in ten New York counties.

Howard Cushing, president of the New York State Conservation Council, says the new law will provide numerous public benefits, primarily by thinning the state's deer population, now at about 1 million.

The state Department of Environmental Conservation estimates that there are more than 50,000 car-deer collisions in New York each year, which should be lowered significantly by a larger deer hunt.

NORTH CAROLINA LAWMAKERS DELIVER MIXED SIGNALS

The North Carolina House of Representatives upheld gun rights by refusing Gov. Mike Easley's request to nullify a law he signed only a few days earlier that established a policy to advise domestic violence victims about applying for a concealed weapon permit. Gun rights won, by a vote of 57-49 against repeal.

But the legislature passed a law in 2004 that revoked previous gun rights that had been automatically restored to convicted felons if they had no repeat offenses after five years.

The law applied to long guns such as hunting rifles, and made it a felony for any previously convicted felon to possess a long gun. That put every ex-convict who went straight and became a solid citizen in line for a new felony just by going hunting.

A Raleigh business owner, Barney Britt, 47, was one such--guilty of a drug charge when he was 20, served his time, model citizen ever since--and he's challenging the change in his status, which he says is a second punishment for the same crime 27 years ago. His attorney Dan Hardway is hoping to find a just solution.

OHIO BILL WOULD ALLOW CONCEALED CARRY PERMITEES TO KEEP NAME PRIVATE

Rep. Jim Aslanides (R-Coshocton) has introduced a bill making changes in Ohio's concealed carry law to allow permit holders to keep their name from the media.

The proposed bill would let a permit applicant sign a sworn statement saying the release of their personal information could lead to a criminal attack. The statement would prevent authorities from releasing their name.

TEXAS EXTENDS RIGHT TO CARRY RECIPROCITY

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott (R) has negotiated, and Governor Rick Perry (R) has signed, concealed handgun licence reciprocal agreements with Michigan and Virginia.

These agreements were made possible by the passage of HB 225, by Rep. Joe Driver (R-Garland), Rep. Glenn Hegar (R-Katy) and Sen. Bob Deuell (R-Greenville) during the 2005 session the Texas Legislature, which improved the reciprocity law.

CANADIANS IN MASSIVE BUT QUIET CIVIL DISOBEDIENCE TO GUN REGISTRY

The Province of Alberta, famed for its Canadian Rockies tourist attractions, isn't known as a hotbed for civil disobedience. But resident Jim Turnbull, 72, who was arrested while protesting the nation's gun registry on Parliament Hill, has a bumper sticker on his car boasting he transports unregistered firearms.

He is also president of the 5,000 member Canadian Unregistered Firearms Owners Association. He says citizen compliance with the gun law is "nil."

Even more bizarre, the police aren't registering their guns either. The Canada Firearms Centre has repeatedly postponed implementing regulations that would force police to register all their weapons, including those seized from criminal offenses, with the federal agency.

A spokesman for the Public Safety Minister justified the latest delay by saying the government is "phasing in" the 1995 Firearms Act to make it "user friendly."

SCOTLAND IS MORE VIOLENT THAN THE UNITED STATES

A United Nations report has labelled Scotland the most violent country in the developed world, with people three times more likely to be assaulted than in America.

Violent crime in Scotland has doubled over the past 20 years, and is now comparable with cities such as Rio de Janeiro, Johannesburg and Tblisi.

The attacks result from the growing "booze and blades" culture in the west of Scotland, where knives have replaced banned guns as the weapon of choice.

Scottish police officials are recommending knife control laws.

SOUTH AFRICAN FIREARMS REGISTRY SLAMMED FOR "INEPTITUDE"

A South African parliamentary committee has called the head of the Central Firearms Registry on the carpet as a result of massive licensing backlogs and badly trained officers enforcing the new gun laws.

Registry Director Jaco Bothma said "masses" of applications were rolling in to the agency, but police were not unduly concerned about the delays.

The committee was not pleased with the dismal performance in completing only 3,937 applications for competency certificates out of 20,397 received since January.

YEMEN ACTIVISTS WANT NO-CARRY LAW

The Yemeni parliament is set to approve a new law banning the carrying of weapons in cities, after hundreds of Yemenis staged a demonstration outside parliament urging them to establish gun-free areas.

The law was approved by the cabinet four years ago, but most Members of Parliament are tribal leaders who don't favor such restrictions.

The interior ministry estimates there are 60 million firearms in Yemen, about three for every person in the 20 million population.

MUSLIM WOMEN IN KASHMIR TAKE UP ARMS AGAINST ISLAMIC MILITANTS

More than 30 women in the disputed region of Kashmir, between India and Pakistan, have formed an all-women Village Defense Committee in the tiny towns of Marah and Kulali to fight militant Islamists who pass through on their way to attacks and force the women to feed and shelter them and give sexual favors.

Most of the men from this village are away working in the Gulf States, which leaves their women, children and elderly soft targets for rape and murder by packs of Islamist thugs.

Shamima Akhter, 30, the commander of the group, said, "I am proud to fight a Jihad (religious war) against marauders who have cheated us of our dignity and honor." She said the only way to stop the militants from harming their fellow Muslims in the village was to kill them with guns and grenades, which they do.

Nishat Bee, 18 years old and the youngest member of the group, says, "Now militants do not dare enter our village." None have since the women armed themselves.

GUN NEWS TICKER - QUICK TAKES ON THE NEWS

● **Baton Rouge, Louisiana:** Fears of post-Katrina disorder have sparked a gun-buying spree in the capital city of Louisiana. Marshall Morgan, owner of Precision Firearms and Indoor Range, says, "We sold out everything." He said that despite the massive influx of police from across the nation, plus 50,000 National Guard troops and government assurances of safety, armed gangs with looted weapons still patrol the street of New Orleans. People are taking no chances. They're getting ready to defend themselves.

● **Claremore, Oklahoma:** State auditors say some 6,000 weapons are missing from the J.M. Davis Arms and Historical Museum, and some have been found at crime scenes. When the state-owned museum was founded in the 1960s its inventory listed more than 20,000 firearms and related items. Oklahoma State Auditor Jeff McMahan says there are now only about 14,000. He says one missing gun was found at a New York crime scene and a machine gun from the museum was found in Maine.

● **Richmond, Virginia:** The National Rifle Association has endorsed the candidacy of Democrat Creigh (Kree) Deeds in the race for Virginia's attorney general. The NRA's more than 90,000 members were informed of his "A" grade on the group's gun rights report card.

● **Cincinnati, Ohio:** The Buckeye Firearms Association has noted that Democrats have in mind to run a pro-gun candidate against anti-gun Republican U.S. Senator Mike DeWine in 2006. The most likely is Iraq war veteran Paul Hackett, who recently flew to Washington, where he met with top Democratic Party leaders about the Senate race. Hackett's spokesman, Jim Schulman, said Hackett doesn't want to discuss the trip. It appears that grassroots advocacy has made it likely that gun owners will be able to vote either side of the ticket for some offices.

● **Titusville, Florida:** Jim Kouri, vice president of the National Association of Chiefs of Police, has exposed two anti-gun hypocrites in the U.S. Senate: Charles Schumer of New York and Dianne Feinstein of California. Schumer not only carries a concealed weapon (with a rare "unrestricted" pistol permit), but he also uses New York City Police to provide armed escorts--but just for him. He doesn't want you to have the same armed safety that he has. Sen. Feinstein also has an unrestricted concealed weapons permit, and made a big splash of turning in her gun for meltdown at a gun-turn-in program in San Francisco. But her police bodyguard let it slip that she gave a cheap model just for show, and kept her .357 magnum revolver for her own personal self-defense.

● **Preston, Minnesota:** Two teachers in the Fillmore school district were suspended for violating the district's weapons policy, one for letting a student bring a detached gun barrel to school for a demonstration during a speech class assignment and another for letting a student bring spent shell casings to class for an art project. Wow, that's really dangerous. The teachers' union, Education Minnesota Fillmore Central, thought it was stupid and filed grievances on behalf of their two members. The school board turned down the union's effort to restore the teachers' back pay for time suspended and remove a reprimand letter from their personnel folders. The hard-nosed school board evidently backs stupid rules instead of reasoned decisions.

● **Wilmington, Delaware:** The 10-year-old federal assault weapons ban expired and a year later the dire predictions that the streets would run in blood failed to materialize. But gun ban advocates don't let that faze them. Their minds are made up, don't bother them with facts. That's the word from Dewey Beach, Delaware resident Sarah Brady, who runs the former Handgun Control, Inc., now renamed the Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence in Washington, D.C. She told the *Wilmington News Journal*, "A year later, I still certainly feel we need the ban." But there haven't been any shootings because the ban ended, and it's been a year. "That doesn't mean there isn't one around the corner."

Parting Shot

DO IT YOURSELF OR CALL 911: TWO STORIES

Zulfiqar "John" Butts owns John's Discount Store in Jonesboro, Georgia. His convenience store was robbed twice and he gave the robbers money.

However, as he said, "If you give money everyday to robbers, you cannot survive. You have to do something."

He did. He bought a gun and kept it under his cash register.

Then one night 22-year-old Keston Scott walked into John's store wearing a mask and demanding all the money.

When Scott crouched as if preparing to shoot, Butts took out his .357 magnum and shot Scott.

Butts told police, "I just shot over here and he lay down on the ground, and his gun fell down over there. And I shoot two more times. Then he like crawling and he go outside the door."

Jonesboro police said the suspect crawled out of the convenience store, got into his car and drove himself to a friend's house. The friend drove Scott to Southern Regional Medical Center for treatment of gunshot wounds.

Jonesboro police sergeant Wayne Woods said Scott was arrested at the hospital after treatment and later taken to the Clayton County jail.

Scott was charged with criminal attempt at an armed robbery, aggravated assault and possession of a firearm in commission of a crime.

Butts told an associated Press reporter he had no regrets.

"It was just easy," Butts said. "You have no choice when you see someone has a gun and they're going to kill you."

Police said Butts will not be charged with any crime, but warned him and the public not to try what Butts did.

"Property can be replaced," said Woods, "but lives can't."

Christine Myers didn't try what John Butts did.

The 18-year-old Broward County, Florida woman used her cell phone to call 911 for help against an assailant.

When an officer from the Sunrise Police Department arrived at her apartment he found her lying dead in a hallway.

Police arrested 26-year-old Edward Mosie, who is being held without bond on murder and sexual assault charges. Police said he also has a no-bond hold for probation violation.

Police have not said how Myers died.
